Whites!

Some players have expressed concern that they are <u>required</u> to wear 'whites' in club competitions. Just to clarify - 'Whites' are not necessary in competitions such as the stages of knock-outs or the preliminary stages of competitions where several members play each other by arrangement in an all play all competition.

We do, however like to see whites (or light colours where whites are not possible) at finals of competitions which last one or two days and are decided there and then and on Finals Weekend. Please note that this is a **preference** and not a **requirement** as we really do want to see you taking part in the club's own competitions.

There are situations where whites (or light colours) are a requirement and that is in South West Federation League matches. This brings me to something that was brought up at our last committee meeting. When players visit other clubs for matches they often see that the members of those clubs are wearing badged clothing which can look very smart. It was felt that it would be good if our members playing in league matches also did this but, as mentioned above, this is not essential.
